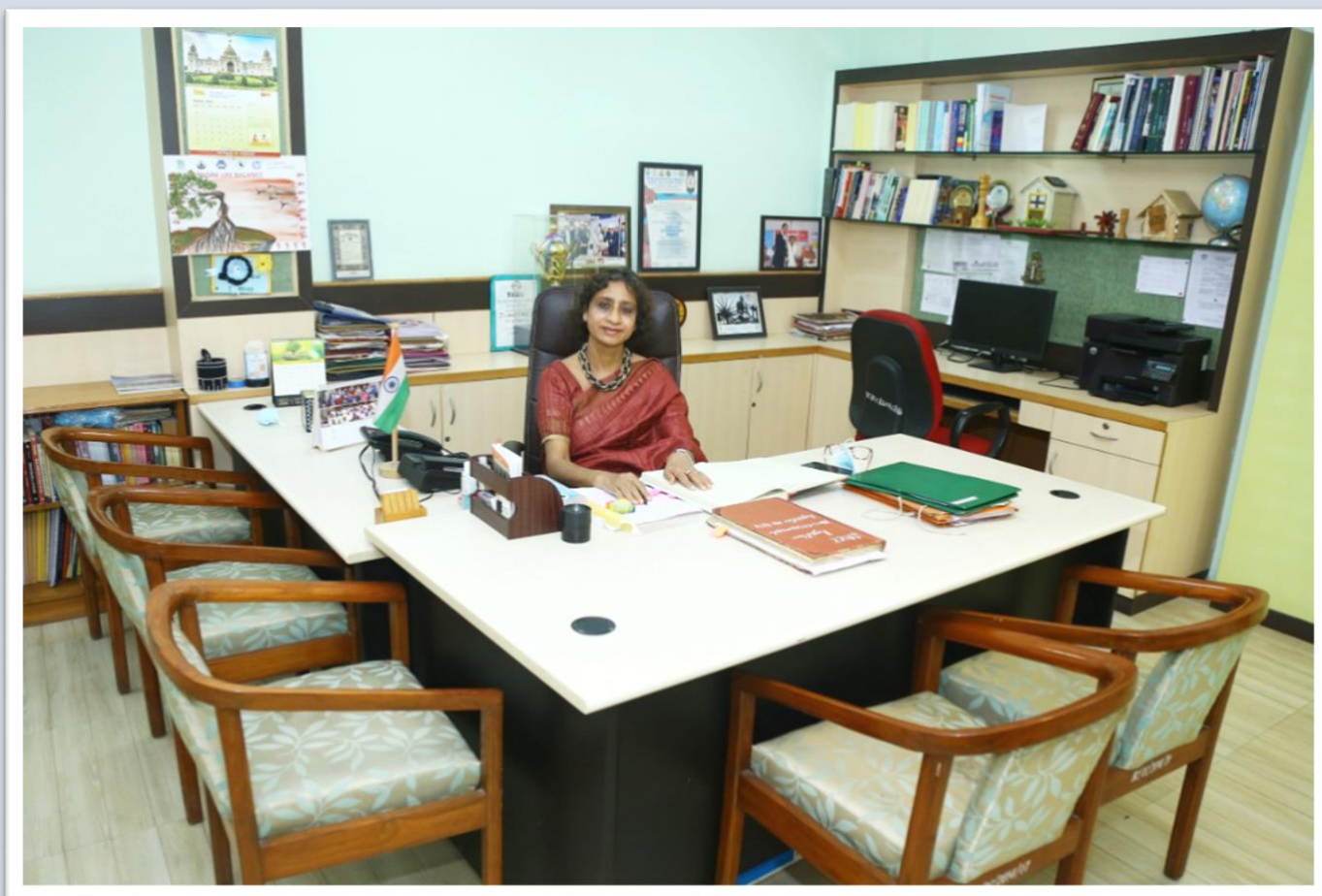




BHARATI COLLEGE PROSPECTUS 2022-23

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COLLEGE PROFILE

Bharati College, one of the top women's colleges in West Delhi, is a constituent College of the University of Delhi. The College was founded in 1971 with its premises at Karol Bagh. It shifted to its present location in Janakpuri in July 1998. Enriched by a faculty of over 130 qualified and dedicated teachers, the College caters around 3000 students. Our alumni have excelled as academicians, lawyers, chartered accountants, politicians, actors and administrative staff. We are confident that all those who join Bharati will reach great heights.

The College is situated in an area of about 8.6 acres of land which has a newly inaugurated state-of-the-art auditorium, a women's hostel, a new academic block, 4 computer labs with over 150 computers with broadband connectivity, a seminar room, a conference room, a theatre room and a large, well equipped library. The library provides access to e-journals, books and other information that can be freely used by students and faculty.

Along with the degree courses, the college also offers a multitude of add-on, short-term courses at very affordable fees for all interested students from within and outside of the College. These include courses in many foreign languages such as German, French, Russian, Chinese; IT courses at 'O' and 'A' levels in collaboration with NIELIT and six additional courses in various professional fields such as Mental Health, Film Making, Digital Marketing, Personality Enhancement, Software Development and Financial Markets. The Software Development courses are offered in collaboration with IIT-Bombay, only to current students and faculty of the College, and are absolutely free of cost. These add-on courses provide the students with a competitive edge in the current workplace scenario. The College aims at developing and inculcating, in its students, the right values so that they grow up into responsible citizens.

The various departments, through their Departmental Societies, aim at guiding and training students beyond the University curriculum by organizing lectures, seminars, workshops, cultural programmes, excursions, etc. It is mandatory for students to participate in annual functions such as Annual Day, Sports Day, NCC Day and NSS Day. Over and above these, for their holistic growth and development, students are expected to participate in at least five other functions organized in the College.

The College also offers many extra-curricular options. It has a vibrant dramatics society called *Chilman*; *Advaita*, a society for contemporary dance; *Elantre*, where students try their hands in the world of fashion; *Chintan*, a debating society; Cinewalkers, the film club, *Mridang* for classical music and dance; *Manthan*, the Nukkad Natak society; *Jagriti*, the women's development cell; *Kopal*, the community and extension cell, and *Palaash*, an Eco-

Every year the College awards a number of prizes to students for meritorious achievements in academics and extra-curricular activities. Scholarships and other kinds of financial aids are given to deserving students on need-cum-merit basis.

Eligibility Criteria

COMMON MINIMUM ELIGIBILITY

The candidate must have passed the Class XII or its equivalent examination from a single recognized board.

* In case a candidate has passed subjects/s from more than one board, s(he) can appear for CUET 2022 in the subjects in which she) has passed Class XII; however, for the purpose of ascertaining the Minimum Eligibility, the marksheet/ degree of only one board will be considered (For example, If a candidate has appeared in CBSE Board Examination with five subjects except for Mathematics and later appears and passes Mathematics from another board such as the National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS), the minimum eligibility shall be ascertained from his/her mark sheet issued by CBSE only).

RESERVATION AND RELAXATIONS

Reservation of Seats for Scheduled Caste (SC) and Scheduled Tribe (ST) Candidates

22.5% of the total numbers of seats is reserved for Candidates belonging to Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribes (15% for Scheduled Caste and 7.5% for Scheduled Tribes, interchangeable if necessary).

The Candidate must be in possession of the Caste/Tribe certificate in his/her own name at the time of Registration and Admission. The Caste certificate should clearly state:

- (a) Name of his/her caste/tribe
- (b) Whether candidate belongs to SC or ST
- (c) District and the State or Union Territory of Candidate's usual place of residence, and
- (d) the appropriate Govt. of India Schedule under which his / her caste / tribe is approved as SC or ST.

Candidate will have to produce the valid original SC or ST caste/tribe certificate at the time of admission.

The following are empowered to issue the requisite SC / ST certificate:

District Magistrate / Additional District Magistrate / Collector / Deputy Commissioner / Addl. Deputy Commissioner / Deputy Collector / 1st class Stipendiary Magistrate / City Magistrate / Sub-Divisional Magistrate / Taluka Magistrate / Executive Magistrate / Extra Assistant Chief Presidency Magistrate / Chief Presidency Magistrate / Presidency Magistrate.
Revenue Officer not below the rank of
Sub- Divisional Officer of the area where the Candidate and/ or his family normally
Administrator / Secretary to the Administrator/ Development Officer (Lakshadweep Islands).

Candidates to note that the SC / ST Certificate from any other person / authority shall not be accepted in any case. If the Candidate happens to belong to SC or ST, Candidate's caste / tribe must be listed in the appropriate Govt. of India Schedule.

It is a statutory obligation on the part of Colleges to fill all seats reserved for Scheduled Caste / Scheduled Tribe Candidates.

Colleges shall not refuse admission to any SC / ST Candidate on the basis of medium of instruction. Any deficiency in the knowledge of any particular language should be addressed; for this purpose remedial classes may be arranged by the College by utilizing grants available from University Grants Commission.

Reservation policy for Economically Weaker Sections (EWS)

As per the University of Delhi notifications (Reference No. Aca. I / Reservation of EWSs / 2019/ 63 Dated 28th March 2019 and Reference No. Aca. I / Reservation of EWSs / 2019 / 101 Dated 15th May 2019), for the reservation for Economically Weaker Sections (EWSs) Category, the University Departments / Centres / Colleges have reserved 10% seats for admission of candidates belonging to EWS category.

Reservation of Seats for Other Backward Classes (OBC, Non-Creamy Layer, Central List)

27% seats are reserved for the Candidates belonging to Other Backward Classes (OBC - Non-Creamy Layer, Central List).

At the time of giving admission to an OBC Candidate, the College will ensure that the caste is included in the Central List of OBC (the OBC status is to be determined on the basis of the Central (Govt. of India) List of OBCs notified by the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment on the recommendations of the National Commission for Backward Classes (available at the website http://ncbc.nic.in/backward_classes/index.html.)

The certificate must mention non-creamy layer status of the Candidate (Non-creamy layer status issued by an authority mentioned in DOPT Office Memorandum no. 36012/22/93- Estt. (SCT) dated 15.11.1993).

The OBC Candidates who belong to the 'Non-Creamy Layer' and whose caste appears in the Central List of the OBCs only, shall be eligible to be considered for admission under the OBC category (Validity period of OBC certificate in respect of 'non-creamy layer' status of the Candidates as per DOPT Office Memorandum No. 36036/2/2013-Estt. (Res- I) dated 31 March 2016). The Certificate should be issued after 31st March, 2022.

It is a statutory obligation on the part of Colleges to fill all the seats reserved for OBC Candidates.

Admission to Supernumerary Seats

Admission to all supernumerary seats will be through CUET 2022. Candidates desirous of taking admission on Supernumerary seats must appear in CUET 2022.

Reservation of Seats for Persons with Benchmark Disabilities (PwBD)

A. Locomotor Disability

Locomotor disability (a person's inability to execute distinctive activities associated with movement of self and objects resulting from affliction of musculoskeletal or nervous system or both), including—

- A. **"leprosy cured person"** means a person who has been cured of leprosy but is suffering from—
- B. i) loss of sensation in hands or feet as well as loss of sensation and paresis in the eye and eye-lid but with no manifestation of deformity;
- C. ii) manifest deformity and paresis but having sufficient mobility in their hands and feet to enable them to engage in normal economic activity;
- iii) extreme physical deformity as well as advanced age which prevents him/her from undertaking any gainful occupation, and the expression "leprosy cured" shall construed accordingly;

"cerebral palsy" means a Group of non-progressive neurological condition affecting body movements and muscle coordination, caused by damage to one or more specific areas of the brain, usually occurring before,

- b. during or shortly after birth;
- c. **"dwarfism"** means a medical or genetic condition resulting in an adult height of 4 feet 10 inches (147 centimeters) or less;
- d. **"muscular dystrophy"** means a group of hereditary genetic muscle disease that weakens the muscles that move the human body and persons with multiple dystrophy have incorrect and missing information in their genes, which prevents them from making the proteins they need for healthy It is characterised by progressive skeletal muscle weakness, defects in muscle proteins, and the death of muscle cells and tissue;
- e. **"acid attack victims"** means a person disfigured due to violent assaults by throwing of acid or similar corrosive

- a. **Visual impairment**
- b. "**blindness**" means a condition where a person has any of the following conditions, after best correction
- c. total absence of sight; or
- d. visual acuity less than 3/60 or less than 10/200 (Snellen) in the better eye with best possible correction; or
- e. limitation of the field of vision subtending an angle of less than 10
- g. "**low-vision**" means a condition where a person has any of the following conditions, namely:
 - h. visual acuity not exceeding 6/18 or less than 20/60 upto 3/60 or upto 10/200 (Snellen) in the better eye with best possible corrections; or
 - i. limitation of the field of vision subtending an angle of less than 40 degree up to 10 degree.
- j. **Hearing Impairment**
- k. "**deaf**" means persons having 70 DB hearing loss in speech frequencies in both ears;
- l. "**hard of hearing**" means person having 60 DB to 70 DB hearing loss in speech frequencies in both ears;
- m. "**speech and language disability**" means a permanent disability arising out of conditions such as laryngectomy or aphasia affecting one or more components of speech and language due to organic or neurological

a. **Intellectual Disability**

A condition characterised by significant limitation both in intellectual functioning (reasoning, learning, problem solving) and in adaptive behaviour which covers a range of every day, social and practical skills, including—

- k. "**specific learning disabilities**" means a heterogeneous group of conditions wherein there is a deficit in processing language, spoken or written, that may manifest itself as a difficulty to comprehend, speak, read, write, spell, or to do mathematical calculations and includes such conditions as perceptual disabilities, dyslexia, dysgraphia, dyscalculia, dyspraxia and developmental aphasia;
- l. "**autism spectrum disorder**" means a neuro-developmental condition typically appearing in the first three years of life that significantly affects a person's ability to communicate, understand relationships and relate to others, and is frequently associated with unusual or stereotypical rituals or

D. Mental Behaviour

"**Mental illness**" means a substantial disorder of thinking, mood, perception, orientation or memory that grossly impairs judgment, behaviour, capacity to recognise reality or ability to meet the ordinary demands of life, but does not include retardation which is a condition of arrested or incomplete development of mind of a person, specially characterised by subnormality of intelligence.

E. Disability caused due to Chronic neurological conditions, such as—

- M. "**multiple sclerosis**" means an inflammatory, nervous system disease in which the myelin sheaths around the axons of nerve cells of the brain and spinal cord

are damaged, leading to demyelination and affecting the ability of nerve cells in the brain and spinal cord to communicate with each other;

b. "**haemophilia**" means an inheritable disease, usually affecting only male but transmitted by women to their male children, characterised by loss or impairment of the normal clotting ability of blood so that a minor wound may result in fatal bleeding;

d. "**Sickle cell disease**" means a haemolytic disorder characterised by chronic anaemia, painful events, and various complications due to associated tissue and organ damage; "haemolytic" refers to the destruction of the cell membrane of red blood cells resulting in the release of

F. Multiple Disabilities (more than one of the above specified disabilities)

Multiple disabilities including deaf blindness which means a condition in which a person may have combination of hearing and visual impairments causing severe communication, developmental, and educational problems.

Any other category as may be notified by the Central Government.

Concessional/Waiver of fees in respect of Persons with Benchmark Disabilities (PwBD)

e. Candidates with physical disabilities pursuing various programs of study in the Faculties, Departments, Centres, and Institutions / Colleges of the University shall be **exempted from payment of fees, including examination fee and other University fees**, except Admission fee, subscription towards Delhi University students' Union and Identity Card fee (As per amendment to Ordinance X(4) of the University).

f. PwBD Candidates who meet the merit for the unreserved category and will take admission in the unreserved category (UR) will pay the fee relevant for PwBD

g. As per the Executive Council Resolution No. 50 dated 03.11.2012, students with physical disabilities residing in different Hostels / Halls of the University are **exempted from payment of all hostel fees and charges** except refundable caution fee and the mess. Persons with Physical Disabilities who are students shall pay 50% of the Mess fee and

the remaining **50% of their Mess Fee** will be met by the University of Delhi. **Similar norms are to be adopted by the Colleges in respect of PwBD Students residing in various hostels of the Colleges.**

PwBD students who are getting fellowships / financial assistance shall be exempted from payment of fees / charges / mess fees subject to the following conditions.

Reservation for Children/Widows of Personnel of the Armed Forces (CW)

Five percent (5%) of seats are reserved for Candidates under this category, program-wise in all colleges.

Candidates desirous of taking admission under the CW quota of the University must appear in CUET 2022.

All such Candidates have to upload the Educational Concession certificate issued by **any of the following authorities** on the proper letterhead:

- h. Secretary, Kendriya Sainik Board,
- i. Secretary, Rajya Zila Sainik
- j. Officer-in-Charge, Record Office.
- k. 1st Class Stipendiary
- l. Ministry of Home Affairs (For Police Personnel in receipt of Gallantry Awards)

No other format shall be permissible. Proofs of the CW category in the form of ID card of parent or dependent, Medical card, Ration card, CSD card, etc. are not admissible in lieu of certificate in correct format. The priority must be clearly mentioned in the certificate. Certificates that do not mention the relevant priority will not be considered.

Admission may be offered to the Children/Widows of Personnel of the Armed Forces (**Priority to IX**) including Para-Military Personnel (**only Priority I to V**), in the following order of preference:

Priority I	Widows/Wards of Defence personnel killed in action;
Priority II	Wards of Defence Personnel disabled in action and boarded out from service with disability attributable to military service;

Priority III	Widows/Wards of Defence Personnel who died while in service with death attributable to military service;

Reservation of Kashmiri Migrants (KM)

Up to 5% seats are reserved program-wise in all colleges for the wards of Kashmiri Migrants. All the wards of Kashmiri Migrants will have to upload a certificate of registration as Kashmiri Migrants issued by Divisional Commissioner/ Relief Commissioner.

Candidates desirous of taking admission under the Kashmiri Migrants quota must appear in CUET 2022.

Prime Minister's Special Scholarship Scheme for J&K students

Candidates desirous of taking admission under the Prime Minister's Special Scholarship Scheme for J&K students must appear in CUET 2022.

Nomination of Seats for Sikkimese Students

Candidates desirous of taking admission under the Sikkim nomination scheme must appear in CUET 2022.

Sikkimese students nominated by the Govt. of Sikkim shall be considered for admission by the University in Colleges where hostel facilities are available (AC Resolutions 51 dated 05/06/1980 and 122 dated 17/12/1990). The allocation of Sikkimese students for admission as well as for hostel accommodation in respective colleges be made by the Vice-Chancellor at his discretion.

Candidates desirous of taking admission under the Ward Quota of Employees of University of Delhi must appear in CUET 2022.

Admission to the wards of University and its College employees, both teaching and non-teaching will be done as per Academic Council resolution 9 a & b dated 27.11.2020 and subsequent amendments thereof.

Candidates must be in possession of a valid Employment Certificate issued by due officials at the time of registration. Only the Employment certificate uploaded at the time of registration will be considered. I-cards, Aadhar Card and/or any other document will not be accepted.

Extra-Curricular Activities (ECA) and Sports Quota

Candidates desirous of taking admission under the supernumerary quota for ECA and/or Sports must appear in CUET 2022.

For admissions to ECA and Sports supernumerary seats a weightage of 25% will be given to CUET score and 75% to certificates/trials/performances.

Further details shall be notified separately.

The College has the right to get a medical examination of such students permitted after centralized trials to be by the medical officer authorized by the College. 4% of the total seats are reserved for admission on sports basis. Students who have participated at the International level will be given direct admission.

An undertaking (on stamp paper of Rs. 100) will have to be signed by all the students admitted on the basis of sports that they will practice regularly and need to be present in the field at 7:00 a.m. sharp and will participate in all matches and sports activities of the College. 75% attendance in sports is mandatory for every student admitted through the sports quota. Those who fail to do so will not be allowed to sit for the University Examination at the end of the Semester.

ADMISSION ON THE BASIS OF EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

As per latest guidelines issued by University of Delhi, ECA admissions category will be based on trials to be conducted CENTRALLY activity wise in colleges to be identified by the Cultural Committee of the University. The Cultural Council will also be forming committees to assign marks for the certificates uploaded by the candidates on the University portal. Students seeking admission on the basis of their achievements in the field of extra-curricular activities like theatre, dance, debates and music will have to present themselves before a committee constituted for the purpose, which will screen the candidates on the basis of their certificates in the last three years and through actual performances. Candidates must present themselves before the Committee on the specified dates and perform if asked to.

The course is run and administered by the college on self-finance and the syllabus is prescribed by Delhi University. The students take the examination prepared and administered by the University of Delhi.

COLLEGE RULES FOR STUDENTS

1. All students must read the Notice Board every day or should visit the College Website regularly.
2. All College property must be handled with care.
3. Silence must be maintained in the corridors during college hours. Anyone caught creating disturbance can have her Identity Card confiscated, which will be returned only on the payment of a fine of Rs 50/-
4. Students must not leave the College premises during College hours or until their classes are over.
5. Students are requested to keep the College premises neat and clean. Anyone caught littering the College premises or the garden can have her Identity Card confiscated, which will be returned only after the payment of a fine of Rs 50/-.
6. Visitors are not allowed within the College premises. Exceptional cases must be referred to the Principal.
7. The Principal has the power to strike off the name of a student from the College rolls if she is irregular in attendance or is wanting in good conduct or is unfit for the course chosen by her.
8. Parents are requested to confirm from the College Principal all information regarding excursions and tours on which their wards propose to go.
9. Students must not remove furniture from the classrooms to sit in the corridors. Anyone found sitting in the corridors will be fined Rs 50/-.
10. Attendance at the Inauguration of Union Festival, Annual Day and Sports Day is mandatory. Those not attending will be fined Rs 100/- per function missed.

The College runs a well-maintained canteen with a seating capacity of 50 people. It provides a variety of quality food and beverages at nominal rates. Extra care is taken towards adequate hygiene in and around the College.



GYM

At Bharati College, we believe that physical fitness is important for all-round development of both students and faculty. Keeping this in mind, a gymnasium was started in 2011 which is now equipped with multi gym station, treadmill, cross trainer, etc. The facility is being availed by many College students, teaching and non-teaching staff on nominal charges. Apart from this, College also has a yoga centre.

The College also has a medical centre with a lady medical officer for free consultation.

FACILITIES FOR DIFFERENTLY ABLED

Keeping in view difficulties faced by differently abled students, the College has separate toilets for them. Space in parking lots has been reserved for them. The college also has ramps, toilets, signage and a room dedicated for them. The enabling room has a computer, printer and facilities for their study.

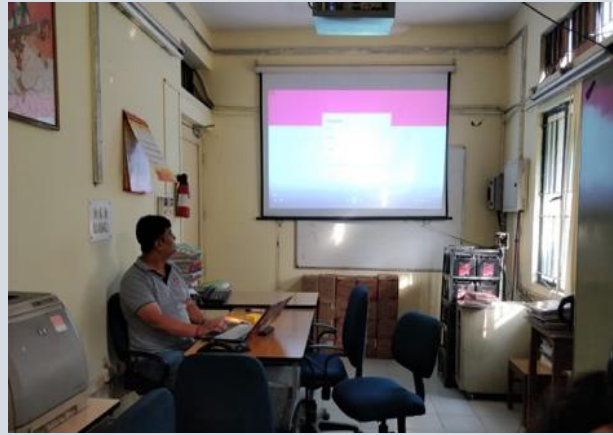


PHOTOCOPY SHOP

A new building with an auditorium has recently been inaugurated.



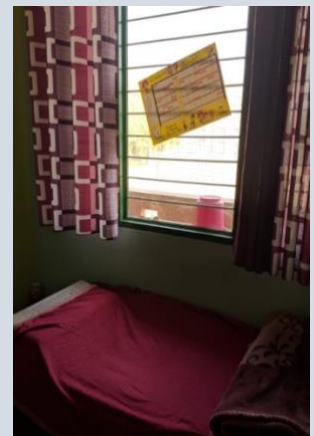
NEW ACADEMIC BLOCK

HOSTEL

Since its inception, Bharati College has always endeavoured to help the students accomplish its aim by providing women quality education, and nurturing a space for growth, learning and empowerment. In December, 2016 Bharati College took a major leap by operationalizing its newly built hostel block, with a capacity of 52 beds. The hostel block is a welcome space for our prospective outstation and foreign students. This hostel will give students the comfort of living on campus access to all its facilities. It aims to provide a safe space for opportunity, exposure and autonomy for students at subsidised rates.



ADMINISTRATION

As part of its administrative staff, the Hostel has a Warden, an Assistant and a hostel committee to take care of admissions, financial transactions, hostel policies, leave issues and action against ragging. There are and will be several student committees which will also participate in administrative work, making the hostel function in a democratic manner.

Admission to Hostel for Scheduled Castes / Tribes Students / PwD / CW

- Out of the vacant hostel seats, 15% seats are reserved for Scheduled Caste Students and 7½% for Scheduled Tribe Students in College/ University Hostels. The allotment of seats in Hostels to Scheduled Caste/ Tribe Students should be based on the merit of Scheduled Caste/ Scheduled Tribe Students of each College and only such students should be considered for Hostel accommodation whose parents are not residing in Delhi.
- However, if seats are available, any case of Scheduled Caste/ Tribe students, whose parents are residing in Delhi, may be examined by the Head of the Institution / Hostel on the individual merits of the students concerned. Last date for admission to the Hostels is fixed according to dates fixed for admission. Seats remaining unfilled in this reserved category may be treated as open seats and be offered to other students after the expiry of last date for admission to Hostels for Scheduled Caste/ Tribe students.
- 3% seats are reserved for the Physically Challenged Students in the Hostels of the University and Colleges.
- Some seats are also reserved for CW quota in the Hostels of the University and colleges.

LIBRARY AND READING ROOM

The College has a large and well-equipped computerized library with the latest text books, reference books and journals in various subjects and disciplines. It also has books, journals and magazines of common interest in order to encourage general reading and to provide a broad exposure of the mind to students. The library works on an Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) system that helps locate all the reading material available on the computer. The College has Wi-Fi Internet connections for the use of the staff and students. Separate reading rooms for the students and teachers make it more user-friendly. A Photocopy machine is also available inside the library for the students.

Library working hours:

The College Library and Reading Room are open to all students throughout the year from 9:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. (barring Sundays and other gazetted holidays).

The library has been divided into various sections:

- (i) **Text Book Section:** Books in this section are issued only for seven days due to heavy demand for the same.
- (ii) **Reference-cum-Reserve Section:** Books in the Reference Section are meant for consultation in the reading room only. Books will be issued only on an overnight basis from the Reserve Section.
- (iii) **Periodical Section:** Periodicals, Journals, etc., of special value are included in this section. Bound volumes and loose issues of periodicals are available for consultation only. The Library also subscribes to 18 newspapers in both languages – Hindi and English.
- (iv) **Book Bank Section:** All needy and deserving students can borrow books from these sections for a maximum period of one semester. The Book Bank Books are available for Economically Weak Section (EWS) students after submission of BPL cards. They must apply to the Principal on plain paper at the beginning of the year.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Silence is to be maintained at all times inside the Library.
2. Membership: All students of the College are entitled to become members of library.
3. A student should show her OMV Card to get a book issued.
4. Students of Honours courses are allowed to borrow four library books. B.A./B.Com Programme students are allowed to borrow two library books at a time for a maximum period of seven days. M.A. students may borrow up to six books for a maximum period of one month.



Timings for issue of books: Text Book Section: 9.30 a.m. to 4.00 p.m.
Reserve Section: 12.00 noon to 4.00 p.m.

5. If a book issued from the Reference-cum-Reserve Section is not returned on the due date and time, the student can be debarred from borrowing books from the library for a certain number of days.
6. If any student is held responsible for tearing out pages from a book or a magazine, strict action will be taken against her.
7. A student who has lost a book or magazine shall immediately make a written report of the same to the Librarian. In case the book is not found within a week the student shall replace the book or pay the current cost. In case the matter is not reported immediately, the student will be liable to pay a fine for the delay in addition to the cost of the book.

Therefore, our first and foremost endeavour is to facilitate and encourage the educational and social needs of these students. Most of our schemes and activities are designed with this section in mind though we also focus on the more advantaged section to make them aware of their rights and duties as responsible citizens of the country. In an effort to develop fully the potential and personalities of our students we also try to expose them to a variety of extracurricular and co-curricular activities and points of view so that by the time they graduate, they are empowered young women.

We have two companies 'A' & 'B'. In each we have 53 seats; total enrolment of students in both being 106. To qualify to be NCC cadets, students have to qualify a physical fitness test conducted by 5 Delhi Girls battalion, Kirti Nagar, New Delhi.



NATIONAL SPORTS ORGANIZATION – NSO



The College has extensive playgrounds and adequate arrangements for Cricket, Kho-kho, Volleyball, Badminton, Table Tennis, Handball, Athletics, Kabaddi, Chess, Taekwondo, Football, Hockey, Yoga and Boxing. Coaches who specialize in these field sports train the students.

BHARATI: The College Magazine

Writing creatively and effectively is a skill that needs to be honed with dedication and practice. Bharati, the College magazine, published annually, provides our students and alumni a platform to write independently and creatively on any topic that interests them and in the form of their choice. Students can write for the magazine in four languages- English, Hindi, Sanskrit and Punjabi.



JAGRITI: WOMEN'S DEVELOPMENT CELL

Bharati College is committed to women's emancipation and empowerment, being an educational institution for women. As a part of its realization of this commitment, it established Jagriti, its women's development cell. Jagriti derives its formational principles from the mandate of the Women's Studies and Development Centre, University of Delhi.



It has since its inception dedicated itself to promoting and launching gender specific enquiries and interventions, which have been organized in College under its aegis to

forward the cause of gender mainstreaming and feminism academically as well as otherwise.



Jagriti is also conducting a safety audit of the College and its neighbouring areas so that we may know clearly what the blind spots in women's safety are in and around our College and address these in a timely fashion.

Upkram-Entrepreneurship Cell

The E cell of the college has commenced to enable its students get first-hand experience in entrepreneurship, promote innovation driven activities at the institute and provide comprehensive and integrated range of support including space, mentoring, training programs, networking and an array of other benefits. The E cell is of the firm belief that Entrepreneurship is the panacea for the unemployment situation rearing its head in the country. The main motive is to bring out the innate potential at the student level to be able to take calculated and planned risks and to innovate the existing situations.

Students work towards conversion of the

horticultural and canteen waste of the College in making compost in five pits. Without using chemicals, only gobar is used in the decomposition process, the process yields enough for the College gardens. The rest is put up for sale.

The Water Harvesting System installed in 2002 continues to function efficiently. There are three water harvesting wells which are managed by students with help from a local NGO.

Special Olympics for the Disabled

International Day of people with disability is observed on 3 December. This day has been promoted by the United Nations since 1992.

We, at Bharati College, as part of the promotion, have been organizing a “Special Olympics for the Disabled” in the month of December since 2005. The observance of the day aims to promote an understanding of disability issues and mobilize support for the disabled. We hope to sensitize our students towards the needs of the not-so able and make them good citizens with concerns for society.



VASANTOTSAV AND SARASWATI PUJA

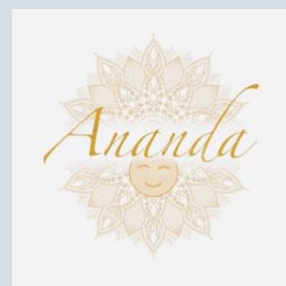

It comprises of various inter college events like Commerce Quiz, Guilty as Charged, IPL Bidding, Economicry, B’Honcho, Business Plan etc. Through the year, it organizes various intellectual intra college events like Extemact, AdMad, Case study, Mock test, Business Quiz, poster making competition etc.



LOK SAMVAD SOCIETY



Run by the Department of Political Science, it works for the purpose of keeping students active, aware and updated regarding national and international issues, in general and political issues in particular. It organizes seminars, talks, debates, and other students’ related activities.

RED STOCKINGS SOCIETY

The primary objective of Redstockings Literary Society of the Department of English is to provide students opportunities for stimulating discussion and debate and promoting the spirit of intellectual enquiry through literary exposure. The society conducts literary activities and seminars towards achieving its goals. Apart from discussions, debates, poetry reading sessions and other activities the members publish a monthly online magazine 'The Redstockings Chronicle' providing a platform for the expression of creativity and talent to its members. Lately, considering the number of requests received, the Society began accepting members from other courses sharing common interests.



SANSKRIT PARISHAD

Run by department of Sanskrit, the aim of the society is to enhance students' mastery over Sanskrit through extra-curricular activities such as recitation, quiz, speech, debate, sketch making, slogan writing competitions etc. Students are encouraged to compete in inter college events which helps them to become confident and articulate.

PRAVAH



To encourage an active campus community that is engaged with history, department of History organizes several seminars, interactive workshops and an annual intercollege festival. To support first hand learning of the subject, it organizes several educational tours - both within and outside Delhi. Students are encouraged to participate in survey work and other such research activities.

HINDI SAHITYA SABHA

Department of Hindi takes initiatives to organize various cultural events on Shikshak Diwas, Tulsi Das Jayanti and Hindi Diwas. It organizes competitions on slogan writing, poetry writing, debate and quizzes. It also shows movies related to their courses and students are taken on educational trip related to media.



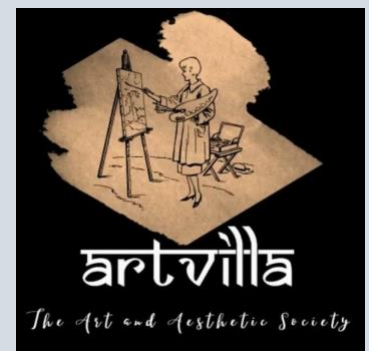
FREAKONOMICS

Freakonomics provides a platform to students and faculty to relate economics to socio-political issues. The society organizes intra-class quiz in economics for students of economics and commerce departments to judge the knowledge of contemporary economic affairs like GST, demonetization etc. Its inter college annual fest is academically challenging and has been very well received. Experts are brought in to conduct problem solving sessions to expose the students to the latest trends in the entrance examination.



Artvilla-Art and Aesthetic Society

The vision of the club is one of inclusion and creativity- everyone is welcome. As the name suggests "Beauty in Art which adores our surroundings", Artvilla is all about learning, inspiring and giving a free space to artists in the college to express themselves. The main focus of this society is to make students aware that art can be a passion as well as a profession.



STUDENT SUPPORT

FEE WAIVER SCHEME

For the economically weaker sections of the society, the College runs a Fee Waiver Scheme under which students who cannot afford college education are granted full fee waiver, including waiver of annual fees. This is an entirely voluntary effort run solely on donation from the teaching and non-teaching staff and well-wishers of the College.

LEARN AND EARN SCHEME – SELF HELP CELL

The College has now also started a Self Help Cell which has identified a number of areas where the College and its staff can absorb some extra hands. So, students can earn as they learn – and they get training not only in formal education, which is part of their curriculum but also practical training in book-keeping, file management, how to deal with medical emergencies, etc. Most students so placed feel empowered because they do not have to beg for help. They gain a sense of independence and worth and get some very useful training which stands them in good stead when they are ready for the job market.

SCHOLARSHIP TO SC/ST STUDENTS

Candidates belonging to the Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes are awarded scholarships by the state to which they belong. Such students are advised to submit the application form in the Office duly completed along with the required certificate of income, statement of marks of the last examination passed and caste certificate in their own name by the dates notified by the College on the Notice Board. No application will be entertained if the same is not submitted by the prescribed date as notified by the Government/College.

PLACEMENT AND TRAINING CELL

The College has an active Placement Cell. It aims to provide access to job opportunities for fresh graduates. In the academic session 2015-16, 94 students got selected in companies like Genpact, Infosys, Mbit Computer Training Private Limited, TCS, Gripadeal, Career Innovators, Indigo and Praxis. In the academic session 2016-17 recruiters came from Indigo, Genpact, KYC consultancy, Career Innovators, Institute of Digital Marketing. Etc. The roles offered were in the areas of cabin crew, hospitality services, consultancy, fashion consultant in retails stores, sales and marketing- digital, desk jobs and operations. Indigo airlines remained the top recruiter and made an offer with salary of INR 35,000 p.m. and lowest package was offered by Praxis hotel with salary of INR 12000 p.m. A total of 35 students were offered full time jobs and 20 were offered internship.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT CELL

The Academic Support Cell has been created to provide free of cost academic assistance to students beyond classroom teaching. Students from different streams are provided guidance for cracking competitive examinations which require proficiency in **English language** and **Mathematical skills**. The unique feature of these coaching sessions is that the method of **peer group teaching** is followed. Students of BA (Hons) English and Mathematics teach students of other streams. Teachers guide and monitor them through the process. This adds to the sense of goodwill and camaraderie in the College.

EQUAL OPPORTUNITY CELL, EOC

The Enabling Committee, a statutory body, caters to the needs of differently-abled students and ensures adherence to government policies.

It oversees admission of students with at least 40% disability for whom three percent seats in all undergraduate courses are reserved. The Committee is further tasked with sensitization and empowerment of the differently abled by giving them access to resource and infrastructural facilities.



Equal Opportunity Cell

To do so, it keeps a close watch on the infrastructural needs of differently-abled persons within the College like Braille signage installed in various key places across the College; creating ramps for safer and convenient mobility; creating separate lavatories; by creating a Knowledge Hub equipped with laptops with relevant reading software and reading material for the exclusive use of visually-challenged students; and by routinely shifting the timetable so that classes for students with loco-motor disabilities are held on the ground floor. It also attempts to tackle social taboos attached to disabilities by organizing workshops and lectures for the College community at large. It works towards building self-confidence in our differently-abled students by routinely organizing personality development and skills augmentation workshops for them, and prepares them for employment by holding career counselling sessions and by organizing special placement drives in collaboration with the Placement Cell of the College.

HEALTH CARE

A Medical officer is available on part-time basis to take care of the medical needs of the students and staff. Medical room in the college functions as an outpatient department looking after minor illnesses and injuries dispenses general medicines and is equipped with a stretcher and a wheel chair. The Medical Officer in-charge also conducts counselling sessions for students as and when required. She also gives basic first-aid training to students of learn and earn scheme.



COUNSELLING CENTRE

"Why can't I feel good about myself?"

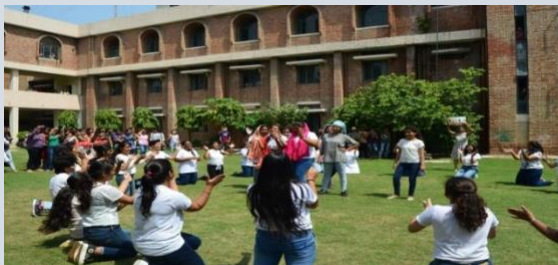
Feeling good about ourselves, nurturing empathic relationships with others, being relaxed and confident, are goals that do not really change through the course of our lives. From school to College we experience a separation anxiety from all those we were close to, and sometimes there is a wish to express all our wishes, conflicts and fears. How we wish we could change our patterns!

Bharati College is one of the few colleges of Delhi University to have a specialised in-house Counselling Centre. The emotional difficulties, anxieties and despair can be contained in the Centre which is a good, safe space in the College. The centre is located at the end of the corridor near the medical room.

Dr. Sonali Jain, Convenor of the Centre, has certification in Psychodynamic Psychotherapy and practises both individual counselling and psychoanalytic psychotherapy, supervised by a trained psychotherapist. Sessions are by prior appointment, unless in case of emergency. Sessions are of 45 minutes each. Total confidentiality is assured.

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

Every year Bharati College holds its Alumni meet on the 3rd Saturday of April. This meet gives an opportunity to our alumni to interact with their old friends, classmates and teachers and share their memorable experiences with all. It further provides a platform for our students to share their success stories and continue to build a bond with the College.



MAINTENANCE OF DISCIPLINE AMONG STUDENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY

(PROCTOR'S OFFICE ORDINANCE XV-B)

1. All powers relating to discipline and disciplinary action are vested in the Vice-chancellor.
2. The Vice-Chancellor may delegate all or such powers as he/she deems proper to the proctor and to such other persons as he/she may specify in this behalf.
3. Without prejudice to the generality of powers to enforce discipline under the ordinance the following shall amount to acts of gross indiscipline:
 - a. physical assault or threat to use physical force against any member of the teaching and non-teaching staff of any institution/department and against any student within the University of Delhi;
 - b. carrying of, use of or threat to use of any weapon;
 - c. any violation of the provisions of the Civil Rights Protection Act, 1976;
 - d. violation of the status, dignity and honor of students belonging to the scheduled castes and tribes;
 - e. any practice, whether verbal or otherwise, derogatory of women;
 - f. any attempts at bribing or corruption in any manner;
 - g. wilful destruction of institutional property;
 - h. creating ill will or intolerance on religious or communal grounds;
 - i. causing disruption in any manner of the academic functioning of the University system;
 - j. ragging as per Ordinance XV-C;
4. Without prejudice to the generality of his/her powers relating to the maintenance of discipline and taking such action in the interest of maintaining discipline as may seem to him/her appropriate, the Vice-Chancellor may, in the exercise of his/her powers aforesaid, order or direct that:
 - a. any student or students be expelled; or
 - b. any student or students be, for a stated period rusticated; or
 - c. be not, for a stated period, admitted to a course or course of study in a college, department or institution of the University; or
 - d. be fined with a sum of rupees that may be specified; or
 - e. be debarred from taking a University or College or Departmental Examination or Examinations for one or more years; or
 - f. that the result of the student or students concerned in the Examination or Examinations in which he/she or they have appeared be cancelled.
5. The Principals of the Colleges, Heads of the Halls, Deans of the Faculties, Head of Teaching Departments in the University, The Principal, School of

Correspondence Course and Continuing Education and Librarian shall have the authority to exercise all such disciplinary powers over students in their respective Colleges, Institutions, Faculties and Teaching Departments, in the University as may be necessary for the proper conduct of Institutions, Halls and teaching in the concerned Departments. They may exercise their authority through or delegate authority to, such of the teachers in their Colleges, Institutions or Departments as they may specify for these purposes.

6. Without prejudice to the powers of the Vice-Chancellor and the Proctor as aforesaid, detailed rules of discipline and proper conduct shall be framed. These rules may be supplemented, where necessary, by the Principals of Colleges, Head of Halls, Deans of Faculties and Head of Teaching Departments in the University. Each student shall be expected to provide himself/herself with a copy of these rules.
7. At the time of admission, every student shall be required to sign a declaration that on admission he/she submits himself/herself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Vice-Chancellor and the several authorities of the University who may be vested with the authority to exercise discipline under the Acts, the Statutes, the Ordinances and the rules that have been framed there-under by the University.

POLICY AGAINST SEXUAL HARASSMENT AND TOWARDS GENDER MAIN STREAMING

The Sexual Harassment of Women at workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act 2013 now in force, defines sexual harassment as “any one or more of the following unwelcome acts or behaviour (whether directly or by implication) namely:

- (i) physical contact and advantages; or
- (ii) a demand or request for sexual favours; or
- (iii) making sexually coloured remarks; or
- (iv) showing pornography; or
- (v) any other unwelcome physical, verbal or non-verbal conduct of sexual nature.

Declaring also that:

“The following circumstances, among other circumstances, if it occurs or is present in relation to or connect with any act or behaviour of sexual harassment may amount to sexual harassment:

- (i) implied or explicit promise of preferential treatment in her employment; or
- (ii) implied or explicit threat of detrimental treatment in her employment; or
- (iii) implied or explicit threat about her present or future employment status; or
- (iv) interference with her work or creating an intimidating or offensive or hostile work environment for her; or
- (v) humiliating treatment likely to affect her health or safety.”

Bharati College has oriented its existing policy and mechanism against sexual harassment to the provisions of the Act as well as to the UGC (Prevention, prohibition and redressal of sexual harassment of women employees and students in higher educational institutions) Regulations, 2015 and has evolved a stringent, holistic approach to the same.

POLICY AGAINST RAGGING

1. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited, within the premises of Colleges/Departments or Institutions and any part of the Delhi University System as well as on public transport.
2. Any individual or collective act or practice of ragging constitutes gross indiscipline and shall be dealt with under this Ordinance.
3. **What constitutes Ragging:** - Ragging constitutes one or more of any of the following acts:
 - a. any conduct by any student or students whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other student;
 - b. indulging in rowdy or undisciplined activities by any student or students which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship, physical or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in any fresher or any other student;
 - c. asking any student to do any act which such student will not in the ordinary course do and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame, or torment or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of such fresher or any other student;
 - d. any act by a senior student that prevents, disrupts or disturbs the regular academic activity of any other student or a fresher;

- e. exploiting the services of a fresher or any other student for completing the academic tasks assigned to an individual or a group of students.
 - f. any act of financial extortion or forceful expenditure burden put on a fresher or any other student by students;
 - g. any act of physical abuse including all variants of it: sexual abuse, homosexual assaults, stripping, forcing obscene and lewd acts, gestures, causing bodily harm or any other danger to health or person;
 - h. any act or abuse by spoken words, emails, posts, public insults which would also include deriving perverted pleasure, vicarious or sadistic thrill from actively or passively participating in the discomfiture to fresher or any other student;
 - i. any act that affects the mental health and self-confidence of a fresher or any other student with or without an intent to derive a sadistic pleasure or showing off power, authority or superiority by a student over any fresher or any other student.
 - j. any act of physical or mental abuse (including bullying and exclusion) targeted at another student (fresher or otherwise) on the ground of colour, race, religion, caste, ethnicity, gender (including transgender), sexual orientation, appearance, nationality, regional origins, linguistic identity, place of birth, place of residence or economic background.
4. The Principal of a College, the Head of the Department of an institution, the authorities of College or University hostel or halls of residence shall take immediate action on any information of the occurrence of ragging.
 5. Notwithstanding anything in Clause (4) above, the Proctor may also suo moto enquire into any incident of ragging and make a report to the Vice-Chancellor of the identity of those who have engaged in ragging and the nature of the incident.
 6. The Proctor may also submit an initial report establishing the identity of the perpetrators of ragging and the nature of the ragging incident.
 7. If the Principal of a College or Head of Department or Institution or the Proctor is satisfied that for some reason, to be recorded in writing, it is not reasonably practical to hold such an enquiry, he/she may also advise the Vice-Chancellor accordingly.
 8. When the Vice-Chancellor is satisfied that it is not expedient to hold such an enquiry, his/her decision shall be final.
 9. On the receipt of the report under Clause (5) or (6) or a determination by the relevant authority under Clause (7) disclosing the occurrence of ragging incidents described in

clause 3(a), (b) and (c), the Vice-Chancellor shall direct or order the rustication of a student or students for a specific number of years.

10. The Vice-Chancellor may, in other cases of ragging, order or direct that any student or students be expelled, or be not admitted for a stated period, to a course of study in a college, or be barred from taking a departmental examination for one or more years or that the results of the student or students concerned in the examination or examinations in which they appeared be cancelled.

11. In case students who have obtained degrees or diplomas of Delhi University are found guilty under this Ordinance an appropriate action will be taken against them under Statute 15 for withdrawal of degrees or diplomas conferred by the University.

12. For the purposes of this Ordinance, abetment to ragging will also amount to ragging.

13. All Institutions within the Delhi University System shall be obligated to carry out instructions/directions issued under the Ordinance, and to give aid and assistance to the Vice-Chancellor to achieve the implementation of the Ordinance.

Punishment for Ragging:

Depending upon the nature and gravity of the offence as established the possible punishments for those found guilty of ragging at the institution level shall be any one of or any combination of the following:

- i) Cancellation of admission
- ii) Suspension from attending classes
- iii) Withholding/withdrawing scholarship/fellowship and other benefits
- iv) Debarring from appearing in any test/examination or other evaluation process.
- v) Withholding results
- vi) Debarring from representing the institution in any regional, national or international meet, tournament, youth festival, etc.
- vii) Suspension/expulsion from the hostel
- viii) Rustication from the institution for period ranging from 1 to 4 semesters
- ix) Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution.
- x) Collective punishment: when the persons committing or abetting the crime of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment as a deterrent to ensure community pressure on the potential raggers.
