Under the guidance of Founder and Project head Pehu Kesar, and with the support of Dr. Saloni Gupta and Ms Ankita Singh, Project Srijan—founded in 2024—is a student-led initiative by Enactus Bharati that brings together sustainability and women empowerment. Through upcycling donated clothes into handmade products, we create livelihood opportunities for women in villages like Titarpur, Tihar, Hastal, and C6D. In our first year, we've conducted donation drives, skill-building workshops, and product launches—turning discarded fabric into tools for independence and impact.

When we started Project Srijan, we had one simple goal—to bring together sustainability and women's empowerment. And today, we're proud to say we're on the right path. We've reached out to over 50 women across four villages—Titarpur, Tihar, Hastal, and C6D. From meeting them, listening to their stories, and understanding their challenges, we've come a long way. With the help of our team and community, we began collecting old clothes through a donation drive. Instead of letting those clothes go to waste, we gave them a new life. Together, we created pouches, scrunchies, dresses, and carpets, all made from recycled fabric. Right now, we have two women who are actively working with us, and their support has been a big part of turning our vision into reality.

Project Srijan stands as a testament to the power of collaboration, purpose, and action. What began as a small campus initiative has now evolved into a meaningful effort to create sustainable livelihoods. With the continued dedication of our team and the support of our community, we are committed to expanding our reach, refining our impact, and building a future where both the planet and its people thrive.

We carried out detailed research to assess the needs, skills, and potential of the women we aimed to work with.


Team members actively contributed by designing and making upcycled products such as pouches, scrunchies, and carpets alongside the women.













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
