Research Workshop



Interdisciplinary Workshop on Research Writing Engages Over 250 Students

The Cathect Society of the Department of Psychology, Bharati College, in collaboration with the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and the Research Committee, successfully conducted a three-day interdisciplinary workshop on "Research Paper Writing and Publication" on February 17, 19, and 21, 2025. The workshop aimed to enhance research aptitude and academic writing skills among undergraduate students and saw enthusiastic participation from over 250 students across various departments.

Organized under the supervision of Dr. Shailendra Vikram, Prof. Rajni, and Ms. Reebika Elangbam, and coordinated by student coordinator Aditi Sehrawat, the workshop brought together a panel of esteemed academicians and experts to provide students with a blend of theoretical insights and hands-on training.



The inaugural day, February 17, began with a traditional lamplighting ceremony and a soulful Ganesh Vandana. The sessions commenced with a lecture on formulating research ideas by Prof. Harinder K. Sandhu from Mata Sundri College, followed by an introduction to research software by Mr. Chandrajeet Singh and Ms. Preeti Vats of Bharati College. The day concluded with a session on qualitative research methods by Dr. Anshu Chaudhary from Indraprastha College for Women.

On February 19, the focus shifted to quantitative research. Dr. Halley S. Thokchom of Aryabhatta College delivered a talk on quantitative research approaches, which was followed by an interactive workshop on questionnaire design by Prof. Anupama Mahajan of Bharati College. The highlight of the day was a practical training session on Excel and SPSS, conducted by Dr. Shilpi Sahi and Dr. Sonali Jain.



The final day, February 21, featured two significant sessions: Prof. Kanika Ahuja, Vice Principal of Lady Shri Ram College, elaborated on the structure and ethics of research writing, while Dr. Akshat Pushpam from Bharati College discussed journal selection and strategies for successful publication.



The workshop was praised for its interdisciplinary approach, expert guidance, and student-centric format. It not only deepened students' understanding of research methodology but also fostered a strong interest in academic writing and publication among the participants.

on 'Concept of Motherland in Hindi and Russian Literature' | February 24 & 25 2025

A Celebration of Scholarship and Spring: Indo-Russian Dialogue at Bharati College



Bharati College recently hosted an intellectually rich and culturally vibrant academic conference that brought together eminent scholars, literary translators, theatre practitioners, and young researchers. The event served as a confluence of ideas and expressions, centered around themes of literature, translation, theatre, and the ever-resonant notion of the "motherland" in both Indian and Russian traditions. The day unfolded with dynamic sessions exploring the intricacies of literary translation and the symbolic power of drama. Panels delved into the philosophical and political undercurrents of texts, examined the challenges of preserving linguistic essence across cultures, and reflected on how the concept of homeland is represented in diverse literary landscapes.

A standout highlight was the grand celebration of Maslenitsa, the Russian Spring Festival, held on the lush Central Lawn. Organized in collaboration with the Russian Embassy School, this lively festivity marked the end of winter and the joyful embrace of spring. The college campus came alive with the sounds of Russian folk music, laughter, and the friendly spirit of cultural exchange.

Students and faculty enthusiastically joined traditional Russian games like gorodki, tug of war, and sack races, while indulging in delicious pancake treats. Heartfelt conversations between Indian and Russian participants enriched the atmosphere as they shared stories of Basant Panchami, Holi, and other springtime customs, bridging cultures through festivity.

Inside the auditorium, the cultural symphony continued with soulstirring performances. Indian classical melodies intertwined with Russian folk rhythms, culminating in a captivating Sattriya dance by



Bharati College's North East Society—a moving testament to the universal language of art. The academic sessions featured a compelling roundtable on literary translation. Esteemed scholars such as Prof. Manju Mukul, Prof. P.C. Tandon, and Dr. Ekaterina Dmitrieva engaged in meaningful dialogue about the translator's role as a cultural bridge, addressing the emotional depth of the native tongue and the complexities of cross-cultural expression. Dr. Galina Alekseeva and Dr. Girish Munjal offered enriching perspectives on translating the "motherland" across linguistic boundaries.



In two dedicated sessions on theatre, speakers like Prof. Ved Prakash Dindoriya and Dr. Shailesh Srivastava reflected on the socio-political dimensions of Hindi drama, especially the nationalistic undertones in Bharatendu Harishchandra's work. Meanwhile, literary analyses of Russian greats—Gogol, Gorky, Pushkin, and Tolstoy—were masterfully presented by Prof. Hem Chandra Pande, Dr. Ekaterina Dmitrieva, and Prof. Marina Arias-Vikhil.

Adding youthful energy to the conference, students from undergraduate and postgraduate programs presented their research on a wide array of themes—from existentialism and memory in Tolstoy's War and Peace, to gendered portrayals of homeland and reflections on inclusive citizenship in both Indian and Russian narratives.

The event concluded with a memorable valedictory session, gracefully moderated by Dr. Rekha Sharma. The keynote address was delivered by Prof. K.K. Kaushik, followed by words of reflection and encouragement from distinguished guests: Prof. Ravi Shankar, Editor of Gagananchal (ICCR); Mr. Dinesh Kandpal, Senior Editor at India TV; Dr. Ilya Zaitsev of the Museum of Oriental Arts, Moscow; and Dr. Boris loganson, Director of the Roerichs Museum, Moscow.

With its seamless blend of academic inquiry and cultural celebration, the conference reaffirmed the enduring role of literature, translation, and performance in shaping national identity and nurturing international friendships. It was not just an event, but a celebration of shared humanity, leaving behind resonant ideas, new connections, and unforgettable memories.

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Departmental Fests '25

The team also received the award for "Most Original Concept" at the Shakespeare Society of India, for their play *Rosaline and Juliet*—a bold reimagining of Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet. The rolling trophy and certificate were awarded by SSI President Mr. Yogesh Kumar Dubey and an esteemed panel.

The Department of Environmental Science kicked things off with *Paakhi'25*, organised by Palaash–The Eco Club, on 20th February. This sustainability-themed fest featured an awareness session on drug abuse by public health expert Mr. Rajiv Shaw.



JournJtsav'25, the premier media festival of Tarseel, the Department of Journalism, Bharati College, was held on 7–8 February 2025. It featured a keynote by Dr. Vineet Kumar and engaging discussions with prominent journalists and authors on media, identity, and mental health.
